WELCOME! Our vision is to be an extraordinary spiritual gathering place where people of all backgrounds and ages are welcome to question and learn, pray, worship and serve; being loved by God in ways that change and improve their lives and the lives of others.

Concerning the Service

Choral Evensong is an offering in song to God, the giver of all beauty and goodness. Based on services held daily in the medieval Church, Evensong as arranged in the Book of Common Prayer of the Anglican Church has been sung regularly since the sixteenth century. This atmospheric and deeply personal form of worship appeals to persons of many faiths and has been adopted as an American tradition in many parishes and cathedrals of the Episcopal Church. In this service most of the music is sung by the Choir, and the Congregation participates by listening to and meditating on the praises, prayers and petitions offered. All join the Choir in singing the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the hymns.

After the introduction to the service (the Hymn or Introit, and the Preces), the Choir sings the appointed psalm(s). A lesson usually from the Old Testament (except of Saints days and in Easter season) follows. The Choir then sings the first of the traditional Evening Canticles, *Magnificat*, the song of the Blessed Virgin Mary when the promises of the Old Testament came true (Luke 1). A lesson from the New Testament proclaims the good news of Jesus Christ, and this is followed by the *Nunc Dimittis*, the song of the aged Simeon when he had seen our Lord in the Temple at Jerusalem (Luke 2). *Nunc Dimittis* is a particularly appropriate text at the end of one's day.

All then sing the Apostles' Creed, an expression of faith of those who, generation by generation in the Christian Church, respond to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, crucified and alive. Prayers are sung by the Choir, ending with the Collects which collect our thoughts.

The timeless and simple liturgy of Evensong readily embraces musical expressions from many centuries. In Choral Evensong, the Choir's responses are drawn from the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, which remains the standard form of text for almost all musical settings of this liturgy owing to the unique beauty of its cadences and imagery.

Evensong is offered each Sunday at 4:00 p.m., September through May. Cathedral Evensong with hymns and canticles sung by the congregation is offered on the first and third Sundays of the month, and Choral Evensong, sung by the Choir is offered on the Second and fourth Sundays of the month. There are occasional exceptions to this pattern.



The First Lesson

Wisdom 7:22—8:1

WISDOM, the fashioner of all things, taught me. There is in her a spirit that is intelligent, holy, unique, manifold, subtle, mobile, clear, unpolluted, distinct, invulnerable, loving the good, keen, irresistible, beneficent, humane, steadfast, sure, free from anxiety, all-powerful, overseeing all, and penetrating through all spirits that are intelligent, pure, and altogether subtle. For wisdom is more mobile than any motion; because of her pureness she pervades and penetrates all things. For she is a breath of the power of God, and a pure emanation of the glory of the Almighty; therefore nothing defiled gains entrance into her. For she is a reflection of eternal light, a spotless mirror of the working of God, and an image of his goodness. Although she is but one, she can do all things, and while remaining in herself, she renews all things; in every generation she passes into holy souls and makes them friends of God, and prophets; for God loves nothing so much as the person who lives with wisdom. She is more beautiful than the sun, and excels every constellation of the stars. Compared with the light she is found to be superior, for it is succeeded by the night, but against wisdom evil does not prevail. She reaches mightily from one end of the earth to the other, and she orders all things well.

MY SOUL doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior. For he hath regarded the lowliness of his handmaiden. For behold from henceforth all generations shall call me blessed. For he that is mighty hath magnified me, and holy is his Name. And his mercy is on them that fear him throughout all generations. The Second Lesson

Hebrews 12:1-14

CINCE we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings Oso closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such hostility against himself from sinners, so that you may not grow weary or lose heart. In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. And you have forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as children— "My child, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, or lose heart when you are punished by him; for the Lord disciplines those whom he loves, and chastises every child whom he accepts." Endure trials for the sake of discipline. God is treating you as children; for what child is there whom a parent does not discipline? If you do not have that discipline in which all children share, then you are illegitimate and not his children. Moreover, we had human parents to discipline us, and we respected them. Should we not be even more willing to be subject to the Father of spirits and live? For they disciplined us for a short time as seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, in order that we may share his holiness. Now, discipline always seems painful rather than pleasant at the time, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it. Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees, and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint, but rather be healed. Pursue peace with everyone, and the holiness without which no one will see the Lord.



David Bartlett

August 5, 1947 – December 18, 2023

David Bartlett's musical career began as a young chorister in the local family church in Folkestone, Kent, England. He attended the Royal College of Music, London, where he was an organ student of Ralph Downes and then moved to Salzburg where he studied at the Mozarteum with Michael Schneider. He participated many times in the International Summer Organ Academy in Haarlem, the Netherlands. Mr. Bartlett moved to the United States in 1975 as a graduate student at Washington University. He was a fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

David Bartlett served churches in London and St. Louis before his appointment in 1982 as the ninth Organist and Choirmaster of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, Detroit. In 2000 he moved to Minneapolis where he directed the music at St. Mark's Cathedral, and then at St. Helena's Catholic Church in St. Paul, retiring in 2022. He presented organ recitals in the United States, England, and France.

In addition to his work as an organist and choral conductor, he composed several hymn tunes, anthems, and carol settings, many of which are still in use in the cathedral in Detroit, and where his musical legacy continues. Generations of Detroit choristers will always remember his stunning descants, particularly those for "Once in royal David's city," and "Lo! he comes with clouds descending."

"In my five years as his assistant, I learned that David was very much a complete musician," said Canon Tarrant. "Aside from his large organ repertoire and his prowess in improvisation at the organ, he had a vast knowledge of the orchestral repertoire and opera. At one point, he had even researched and prepared a series of lectures on the operas of Benjamin Britten. He had a profound influence on so many of us, and we proudly bear his stamp on our musical life here at the Cathedral."

Mr. Bartlett died at his home in Minneapolis on December 18, 2023. He is survived by his sister, Janet and her family.

Interment will take place in the Nativity Chapel columbarium here in the Cathedral on a date to be announced.

Notes on the Music

While the hymn, Praise to the holiest is assigned the tune *Gerontius* in our current hymnal, it has become our custom to sing this text to Arthur Somervell's *Chorus angelorum*. Included in its singing this afternoon is a last-verse arrangement with descant by David Bartlett dating from the middle of his tenure at this Cathedral.

George Dyson's beloved *Evening Service in D* serves as the setting for the canticles this afternoon. Dyson was particularly passionate about the power of unison singing, as illustrated here. The Preces and Responses were written for the Choir of Christ Church Cranbrook in 1992 by then Organist and Choirmaster of Cranbrook, Charles Raines. The Cathedral Choir sang this set during their residency at Chichester Cathedral in 2014, and recorded them for their 2016 CD, *Evensong for All Saints*.

Frederick Faber's nineteenth century text *There's a wideness in God's mercy* is most often associated with his contemporary, John Zundel's tune *Beecher* (Hymn 470). Today we sing this hymn to Maurice Bevan's tune *Corvedale*, the lyric quality of which casts a rather different sense of the text for those familiar with the traditional juxtaposition. This text and tune were selected by David Bartlett for his final service as Organist and Choirmaster in September of 2000.

The 20th century English composer John Ireland was a pupil of Charles Villiers Stanford, and made a name for himself first as a composer of the songs and chamber music. Active as an organist and choral conductor, he also composed a great deal of music for the liturgy. Today the Choir sings the piece for which Ireland is best known, *Greater love*, a sublime and profound musical statement of texts that relate the true meaning of love as exemplified in the life of Jesus Christ.
